Salford – China: towards global harmonisation of construction research

A SCRI team led by Prof Aouad, Head of the School, visited five major Chinese universities (Tsinghua University, Hong Kong Polytechnic University, Tianjin University, Tongji University, and Harbin Institute of Technology), under the banner of UK-China Partners in Science, a one-year program supported by both British and Chinese governments to promote communication between scientists in the two countries.

"A construction boom prevails in China which is on the fast track of development. However, high energy consumption and low efficiency is a big problem. The country is still in the process of industrialization and faces the post-industrialization surge in the era of globalization. It is a challenge", commented Professor Qin Youguo from Tsinghua, "The experience of the UK will help China to avoid the same mistakes that the UK has made during its industrialization," said Professor Aouad during exchanges.

All agreed that distance, cultural background, mechanisms, and funding resources would be possible barriers for further cooperation but there was willingness to work together, one initial idea being a website to facilitate real-time exchange of ideas.

Salford Staff reconstruct the Battle of Waterloo

Staff in SCPM and the School of Environment & Life Sciences have worked together to produce a virtual reality model of the farm at Hougoumont which was critical to Wellington's defeat of Napoleon's Grand Armée. Wellington's men successfully held the farm throughout the day of the battle, thus helping to defeat Napoleon. The virtual reality model attempts to help historians shed light on how it was done.

Revolutionary field laser scanning technology was employed over two days on site with a following week processing data and adding photographic texturing back at the University, to build a 3D virtual reality model of the area, which is being used by military historians to give them a unique view of the conditions facing troops during the battle.

The project will be featured in an hour long episode of Granada Television's Battlefield Detectives to be broadcast for The History Channel in the Autumn.

Staff bid success

Dr Dilanthi Amaratunga has secured funding from ESF to carry out research in "Construction and Women". Total value of the work is £ 313K. Dilanthi is supported by a team of researchers including Dr Richard Haigh, David Baldry, Prof. Ghassan Aouad, Dr Martin Sexton, Prof. Les Ruddock, Paul Chynoweth, Rita Newton, Dr Bingu Ingirige, and Dr Angela Lee. This project will focus on low female engagement in a professional capacity within the construction sector (both industry and academia) and will involve researching the education and training needs of professional women in the sector.

Women in Construction - 'This *was* a Man's World...'

That is why Hopwood Hall College, in collaboration with Bramalls Construction and The University of Salford hosted their first ever *Women in Construction Day* on 21st June 2005. (Continued from page 4) Fourteen Year 10 pupils from Balderstone Technology College, Rochdale enjoyed a fun packed day and gained a thorough understanding of what it means to work in construction. The day began with a visit to Bramalls head offices located at the impressive Lighthouse in Salford Quays. The group were welcomed by Bill Sergeant. Construction Training Manager, who introduced Trevor Gee, Western Regional Management Director and Paul Hughes, Area Director. The girls learned that a multi million pound construction company needed a broad range of skilled workers. from Receptionists to Accountants and Directors. The group also visited a working construction site -Crossfell Primary school in Crumpsall, North Manchester. As the building was nearing a state of completion, the girls met a wide variety of skilled trades-people, from Plumbers to Electricians. Plasterers to Joiners...

Later, at the University of Salford, in a taster day organised by Haizhu Cannon, Dr Dilanthi Amaratunga, senior lecturer and Frances Joddrell, Education Liaison Officer were able to tell the girls about student life and the qualifications needed to get the types of jobs they had seen being done that morning. The girls also tackled a hands-on Roller Coaster Exercise in the afternoon session, led by Mark Shepherd, Programme Director for BSc (Hons) Property Management and Investment and Dr Atif El'Hasia, a Construction Ambassador. Their challenge was to build a rollercoaster capable of conveying a marble down a track with only the most basic of materials.

The event was part funded by Aimhigher and the CITB. Following the success of the day, the verbal feedback was extremely encouraging. Many pupils said they were now thinking about studying at University and would be considering courses in construction. It is planned to make the *Women in Construction Day* an annual event.

The Research Institute for the Built and Human Environment (BuHu), and the Salford Centre for Research and Innovation (SCRI) hosted the 2nd International Research Week at the Lowry, Salford Quays. The week comprised the SCRI Industry Day, 2nd International SCIR Symposium and the 5th International Postgraduate Research Conference in the Built and Human Environment.

SCRI Industry Day was built around the theme of "Delivering Health Care in the Built Environment". Presentations by internationally leading academics and practitioners including healthcare providers and users illustrated future emerging trends in the area. The 2nd International SCRI symposium brought together an international audience with a wealth of research and experience, who heard around 50 papers.

The 5th International Postgraduate Conference provided a stimulating and supportive environment for built environment postgraduates to present their research and meet other researchers working in similar fields. Delegates heard some 98 papers presented, representing 38 different countries.

Other events included:

- Keynote addresses from leading academics and industrialists to provide a global perspective and vision for built environment research:

- Constructive feedback for each researcher on their paper and presentation;
- An organised tour around Manchester to meet other delegates in an informal setting

The RICS Awards celebrate the best building and conservation projects and the winners will take their place in a long line of highly original and impressive built environment projects. The entries were judged across four categories: **Building Conservation**, Regeneration, Sustainability, and Community Benefit. A total of 12 schemes were entered from the Northwest region. The projects range from the restoration of 'The Lion's Den' in Oldham's Alexandra Park to a new mixed-use development on the outskirts of Liverpool to the redevelopment of Sale Waterside. The winner from each category will go forward to the national round. Grand Designs presenter Kevin McCloud will present awards to the national category winners and to the overall RICS Building of the Year winner at a gala ceremony to be held in London in October 2005.

Competition is in its third year and celebrates the best of North West journalism in the fields of land, property and construction. Entries come from any publication in the North West either directly from journalists or RICS members who nominate journalists for particular articles they have written during the year December to November.



CCI Operation Director addresses Liverpool Chamber of Commerce and Industry's Construction and Development Lunch

Andrew Thomas, Director of the Centre for Construction Innovation and National Board, member of Constructing Excellence, recently addressed over 200 people at the Liverpool Chamber of Commerce and Industry's Construction and Development Lunch.

Andrew set out the Policy and Drivers for change in the construction industry and the initiatives that have supported the construction industry to embrace change and improve its performance. He described current and emerging papers and legislation on sustainability and the delivery of community benefit from construction and development projects including contractual conditions in publicly funded and grant assisted projects delivered by property developers, as well as projects undertaken directly by public bodies. Andrew urged attendees to ensure that they engage in consultation exercises on new policies.

Student symposium in the built environment

The 2005 annual North West Student Symposium was this year jointly organised by CEBE, in collaboration with the University of Bolton. Hosted by Bolton in April 2005, the event brought together final level Built Environment students and academic staff from universities throughout the North West of England, together with employers with an interest in research. It is designed to provide an opportunity to exchange ideas and study experiences and allow an exploration of the potential use of innovative research within industry. Students are able to present the findings of their final year dissertations to peers and staff from partner institutions. The symposium draws support from the Association of Building Engineers, The Chartered Institute of Building, The Royal Institution of Chartered

Surveyors, the British Institute of Architectural Technologists, and the Construction Industry Council. A wide range of topics were covered this year including a best practice model for urban regeneration-how the terrorist bombing of 1996 affected Manchester's urban regeneration, the classification of contaminated land as waste and how successfully ISO 9000 quality standards have been implemented in the construction industry.

Prizes were awarded in both the best paper and best presentation categories. The best presentation winners were Chris Lord (University of Salford, pictured below, right) and Linsey Brown (UCL, pictured below, left). Commended were Ebun Akinsete (Bolton) and Mike Walmsley (University of Salford).

Launch of construction 2020 report

Looking to the future is an important step in any industry. The Co-operative Research Centre for Construction Innovation in Australia consulted industry leaders and members around the country eliciting their comments with a view to refining future research within the industry. All this information was collected and analysed and culminated in a report Construction 2020 - A Vision for Australia's Property and Construction Industry. This report, co-written by Keith Hampson and Peter Brandon (SCPM). documents a framework upon which Australia can set a research agenda. At the launch Minister McGauran (Minister for Science) heralded the Construction 2020 document as "the blueprint for the Australian Property and Construction Industry" and commended the CRC for Construction Innovation for this visionary initiative.

Global agenda for construction industry launched

Researchers have unveiled a major new initiative set to radically reform reputation and practice in the construction industry. Revaluing Construction - a University of Salford led research initiative looked at ways to create better value, more efficient processes and better jobs in construction – was officially unveiled at the CIB (International Council for Research and Innovation in Building and Construction) 11th Joint Forces Conference in Helsinki.

The international project, funded by the CIB, reveals a lack of trust between industry professionals - the cost of which leads losses of between 8-20% of the total contract price. It recommends longer-term perspectives and relationships including partnering arrangements to help combat this so that the value jointly created by construction is maximised, and the resulting rewards are equitably distributed between all stakeholders.

Salford University Pro-Vice
Chancellor for Research and
keynote speaker Professor Peter
Barrett said: "Construction is often
seen as confrontational, lacking
vision and engaged in 'cut throat'
competition - exacerbated by a lack
of trust and poor communications.
Our Global Agenda involved
international workshops and
surveys to identify areas of
improvement in the future. The
findings are highly significant and
we are confident they will move the
construction industry forward."

Work is continuing to promote and develop a more efficient and valued construction industry. National programmes across the UK, the Netherlands, Australia and other countries are being introduced to take this initiative forward.
